OMNI is President's Distinguished 11 Years...in a row

Omni Toastmasters celebrated on June 24th, 2010 when it became a President's Distinguished Club for the eleventh year in a row. OMNI members Darrell King and Chuck Rudis completed their Competent Communicator manuals to push OMNI to the top. Stepan Babanin also completed his Advanced Communicator Bronze.

In order to be a President's Distinguished Club there are ten requirements. The club must have all officers trained at semi-annual training sessions, there must be a net gain of at least 2 Competent Communicators; in addition, the club must have a net gain of at least one advanced communicator or advanced leader. The club must also recruit new members and may qualify for one or two points by the number recruited. Membership dues and officer lists must be reported to Toastmasters International in a timely manner.

So what's the big deal? Clubs that reach Distinguished Status have their act together. They are the "movers and shakers" of Toastmasters. These clubs are doing the right things to attract new members and train them to be better speakers and leaders. This is a team effort and the OMNI officers for 2009-2010, under the direction of outgoing president Tim Tyckoson, made it happen.

As OMNI moves on to its new year, 2010-2011, we again look forward to attracting many new members to our club and helping them achieve their goals to improve their speaking and leadership skills. President's Distinguished is our club goal but more importantly we want to train our existing members and new members to attain the leadership and speaking skills they first sought out at OMNI.

Introductions

Introductions - reminders and tips to get the most out of your Toastmaster experience:

The **purpose** of the introduction is to give a pertinent background of the speaker that encourages the audience to listen to what that person has to say.

Preparing your introduction helps you focus on the message of your presentation in your role. It can "set the stage" for your talk, and can also be a nice tie-in to the theme of the meeting.

For the speaker, your introduction should be a 15- to 30-second written biography, sharing your authority or experience, or something that defines you as a toastmaster or an individual.

However, it is important to use this feature to introduce your speech – to pique interest in your topic, to explain your objectives, or to describe your target audience if it's in a setting other than a Toastmaster club.

For everyone else, your introductions should be short and sweet. Focus on a couple of sentences about yourself as a toastmaster or maybe something about you related to the theme of the meeting.



Sending your introduction prior to weekly meeting:

Toastmaster of the Week: please e-mail your introduction to the Sergeant at Arms , who will open the meeting and introduce you.

Speakers, General Evaluator and Table Topics Master: please e-mail your introduction to the Toastmaster of the week.

Evaluators: please e-mail your introduction to the General Evaluator.

(The technical table participants do not need introductions.)

When introducing others, you are encouraged to memorize and present the content of the introduction versus reading it, unless the speaker requests that something be quoted. This gives you practice in **thinking on your feet**, as well as presentation skills.

Club Ambassador Program...

District 84 has a special program that helps clubs find new ideas and network with other Toastmasters. A club Ambassador visits other clubs to see how they conduct meetings, makes notes of things that make the clubs visited unique and builds up the local Toastmaster organization by networking with other club members. At the completion of three different club visits, the Toastmaster is awarded a special pin and certificate for his/her work. Why not consider being a **Club Ambassador** this year. Website News - Members Only



The OMNI Toastmasters web site and many other freetoasthost toastmaster websites offer an area for members to keep track of their progress as Toastmasters. In order to do this, you need to go to the "members only" area of your local club web site and login with your user id and password. If you don't know your user id or password, contact your club's webmaster.

Once you are in to the members area you can do many things. There is an area to plan your goals for the year, an excellent way of tracking your progress in the club. We all know that goals need to be adjusted from time to time; this tool has the ability to make those changes.

There is also an area where you can update your website profile. Just like we all need to update our resume when we attain a new skill, this website function lets you add new information about yourself to the site in the "meet our members" section.

There are club tools available in this area so that club officers can plan out the year and realize their goals. This area has two tools: the "The Duty Roster" helps plan club meetings, and the "Club Goals" section has a template for how the club can obtain "Distinguished" status.

Take a few minutes and tour the "members only" area; it has many tools to make you a successful OMNI Toastmaster.

Take Five

Welcome. From the first evening I walked into an OMNI Toastmasters meeting, I felt welcomed and appreciated. They were having a special awards night, with food and presentations of “Toastmaster of the Year” and the “Gerry O’Meara Spirit of Success” Awards, the format of which they explained was not typical of their meetings. They invited me to come back the next week to see what their normal meetings were like, which I did. Again, I was warmly welcomed. The atmosphere in both meetings seemed nurturing, with lots of encouragement and shared laughter among the participants. From the very beginning, OMNI was a place where I instinctively felt “at home”.

I still see this attitude toward our visitors. Whenever I receive calls from people interested in attending an OMNI meeting, I can tell the prospective guest that he or she will be welcomed with open arms and know that my words are true. OMNI always greets its guests warmly, and offers a nurturing home to all who seek development of their communication and leadership potential.

Encouragement. I remember wondering what a Toastmaster meeting would be like... Would the speakers be evaluated critically? Would the standards be strict? What were the club’s expectations? My questions were answered in short order, as it soon became clear that OMNI encouraged its members to learn and grow by creating a safe, nurturing environment in which to spread fledgling wings and fly.

Indeed, whether we are on our first flight, or soaring with the eagles, OMNI provides guidance appropriate to our communication level. Care is taken to affirm what we’ve done well, and to wrap insightful suggestions for improvement inside meaningful, encouraging feedback.

We are inspired to soar higher and further, always learning (whether it be from our own speaking experiences or from listening to others.) I love the feeling that we are all being cheered onward by our fellow OMNIans and the knowledge that they sincerely want each of us to succeed.

Growth. One of the most appealing things about being a Toastmaster is knowing that we share something very special – the desire to continue developing and growing. To that end we seek to improve our communication and leadership skills through the programs OMNI and Toastmasters International offer.

I have seen individuals grow beyond their own expectations, overcoming their fear of public speaking to achieve Competent Communicator and Advanced Communicator status, as well as compete in speech contests at the club level and beyond. Our confidence grows with each new accomplishment. Watching the transition from Ice Breaker to CC and beyond (both for myself and others) highlights the growth possible with our work at OMNI.

Even more growth is possible for the future. Area 41 has just gotten more competitive, with three new clubs that will challenge us in competitions. OMNI will be pushed to new levels of excellence, which is good news for all of us.

Governor Marketing shows that even further advancement is possible for any of us in OMNI. (Jim Ocque is another inspiring example of OMNI success.) Our leadership potential is wide open – it's up to each of us to embrace the opportunities that present themselves.
